

Five New Residences & "Bug" Room Added

Last summer the opening of the Tod and Maxine McClaskey Family Resource Center (MFRC) was exciting! Open House staff and



residents have been utilizing it for gym time, larger church meeting space, special events, and more. In addition, most of the full-time

staff moved their offices to the MFRC freeing up space in the original shelter building for new opportunities.

All of our hopes, dreams and prayers are coming to fruition. It's exciting that we're going to be able to help even more homeless families in the near future," says Reneé Stevens, Executive Director of Open House Ministries

Dave Hamby, Facilities Director said, "By deleting office space and reconfiguring the first floor of the shelter, we were able to add five new resident rooms."

Each apartment includes a kitchenette with a sink, a small refrigerator, cupboards, and table with chairs. Rooms are also outfitted with a dresser and beds for the entire family – doubles, twins and sometimes a bunk bed format.

In addition, a "bug" room will be added to the first floor. "This completely enclosed area of 100 square feet is able to raise the ambient temperature to 130+ degrees to eliminate bed bugs and other critters, acting as the first line of defense against potential pest control issues after new residents and their belongings are moved in." says Hamby.

Renovations are currently underway

and scheduled to be complete by the end of May 2019.

The Value of Another Storm

Chaplain's Corner - April, 2019

On February 28, 2019, Open House Ministries was put on emergency lock down, as a gunman walked down the street waving pistols at anyone



passing nearby. Moments later, four gunshots rang out, and a man laid mortally wounded by responding police officers. This young man left behind many friends, a shocked neighborhood and a five-year-old daughter.

This critical incident marked a day that we will all remember: many of our residents watched the violent confrontation from the windows of our Shelter, while others could only listen to the gunfire and wonder at who had been shot. The trauma triggered some of our residents, who were again transported to memories of the dangerous days of the past. Within the hour, the Community of Open House was caring for one another, and particularly for our children, a few of whom had actually witnessed the shooting.

Most certainly, GOD protected us. Yet, He also is redeeming that very violence, reminding us that "in all things GOD is working for good for those who love Him" (Romans 8:28). These are simple words,

but hard truths. Several street people commented on needing to get clean and sober—once and for all. Others spoke of needing to get help with their mental health (issues). Our residents were reminded of the need not just to love their kids, but also to protect them from the violent images of our culture. In group meetings, there were tears of gratitude for our New Life in Jesus, which helps make sense of the senseless.

John Piper says that nothing touches us that doesn't come through His fingers first. As hard as it is, we can know that GOD is working even in the worst of our storms. He does not leave us alone to find our own way out of the blackness, but He helps us as "the Father of compassion and the GOD of all comfort" (II Cor.1:3). He restores our hope - "and hope does not disappoint, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us" (Romans 5:5).

As hard as it is, we can know that GOD is working even in the worst of our storms. He does not leave us alone to find our own way out of the blackness, but He helps us as "the Father of compassion and the GOD of all comfort" (II Cor.1:3)

This Easter, we recall the maelstrom of the Cross, and worship our risen Jesus, knowing that the Storm that He suffered was intended to set us free... free indeed.

At the time of this writing, Vikkilynn is gearing up for Easter and putting out the welcome mat for Spring. The children will be learning about Resurrection

Eggs which are a great way to connect Easter eggs to the story of Jesus. The daycare staff will be sending the children on a hunt that will lead them to the treasure of Easter!



They will read the story together, open each egg, and find the surprise inside—a symbol of Jesus' journey to the cross.

The teachers and kids will also be reading "Benjamin's Box". What are the treasures in Benjamin's Box? The kids will get to go along with Benjamin and see. Like all boys and girls, Benjamin is very, very curious. When Jesus

comes to Jerusalem, Benjamin decides to follow him and find out who he really is. At first, Benjamin thinks Jesus is a teacher, then a King. At last, he learns the good news—news that every child (and grown-up!) will want to share. This book will be used in conjunction with Resurrection Eggs.

Our resident children are growing and always learning! Given the safe and

healthy environment at OHM, our children get the enjoyment of just being kids! Unencumbered by fear, hunger, or an unstable family life, they are thriving!
