

## CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

### Walking in the Newness of Life

Most people assume that changing your life is mostly a matter of deciding to do better. If that were true, places like Open House Ministries would not need to exist. The truth is that learning to live well requires a community willing to tell the truth about our lives.

That kind of truth is not always comfortable. It means learning new habits. It means accepting guidance from others. It means discovering that the stories we have been telling ourselves about our lives are sometimes incomplete or simply untrue.

That kind of community is not always easy to live in. It has expectations. It asks people to take responsibility for their choices. It creates rhythms and boundaries that make it possible to rebuild a life that has come apart.



At Open House Ministries, residents enter that kind of community for a season. The goal is not simply to provide shelter. Our aim is to create a place where people can begin learning new habits. Habits of responsibility, honesty, work, and faith.

Life here has a way of bringing the truth about our lives into the open. When you live among people who know your story, it becomes harder to pretend that nothing needs to change. A different life cannot remain an idea. It has to begin to take shape in how people speak, work, and live alongside one another.

Every once in a while, the long work of change takes visible form. This past month,



eight residents stepped forward to be baptized. They stood before a room full of people who already knew their stories. Staff. Friends. Other residents who understood what it cost to stand there.

Baptism is a strangely public act. Baptism leaves little room for hiding. To step forward is to stand before others and acknowledge that the life you have been living cannot continue as it was. It is a way of standing before others and confessing that your life now belongs to Jesus Christ.

Now, when the celebration was over, and all that remained was water splashed across the gym floor and towels scattered on the ground, the cleanup began. The same people who had just heard those confessions were stacking chairs and dragging out a hose to drain the baptismal. Those who stood in the water moments earlier were now alongside them, helping return the gym to ordinary life.

The Apostle Paul writes, "We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:4). That newness of life does not lead away from life together but deeper into it. The truth spoken in the water did not set anyone above the rest. It joined them more fully to the same life of grace and service, made real by Christ and sustained by His life among us.

# Putting the Pieces Back Together

**F**inding what you need to start a new life is challenging. For Wendie and Aaron, a place to stay was only the beginning. Both were struggling from the impact of drugs and addiction in their lives. Wendie had just been released from prison, and Aaron was on the brink of being evicted from his apartment when they were introduced to Open House Ministries.

Connections to the ministry helped to facilitate an emergency move-in, and soon the couple had a space to stay in the shelter, away from harmful influences that were keeping them from living stable lives.

They recalled how their lives changed when they were able to spend time learning about God, and how they found a way to let go of guilt and shame. "When I came to Open House, I was lost, scared, and my family was broken and separated," said Wendie.

The couple found new direction and healing through the classes at Open House Ministries, and shared their gratitude for learning new skills vital to rebuilding their lives. "Living at Open House Ministries gave me the opportunity and the means to heal and grow," said Aaron. "I was able to deal with what was holding me back from a life I deserve and have a family and team to walk me through it."

Starting over in a positive and safe environment made all the difference for this couple. Wendie spoke about how her options after leaving prison could have led to a completely different outcome. "The only places I had to go were

unsafe due to the active use of drugs," shared Wendie. "Open House Ministries saved my life!"

Both Wendie and Aaron found a solid path to learn new skills and found the support they needed to start over. They touched on the joy they experienced during Christmas time while they were here and how living in a family environment helped them throughout their journey to recovery.

Wendie and Aaron expressed their appreciation for the richness of the program at Open House Ministries and shared their gratitude for the opportunity to establish a new relationship with God and grow. "Open House is so much more than a shelter," said Wendie. "It is a safe place to rebuild your life. All the classes are in-depth. The guidance and support of the staff is second to none. They

helped us learn that with God as our foundation, anything is possible."

Aaron shared how he couldn't imagine what his life would be like today without Open House Ministries stating that God definitely had a hand in his time here. They both expressed the blessings they experienced from everyone in the ministry. "The staff truly cares," said Aaron. "From the program director to the front desk, I know I have a forever family with Open House."

We are grateful for Wendie and Aaron, and their commitment to rebuild their lives at Open House Ministries. Please pray for them as they continue to grow in their relationship with their family and Christ. ●
