### **CHAPLAIN'S CORNER**

# Building Community

n classical Hebrew, there are three words for community: edah, tzibbur, and kehillah. Rabbinic tradition teaches that these words are not mere synonyms. They each have their own distinct meaning.

Edah comes from the word meaning "witness." It is an expression of community formed by those who have attested to the same thing or gathered for a common purpose. For example, those who have attended a conference, or in the case of the 12 spies who surveyed the Promised Land in the Book of Numbers, was an Edah.

**Tzibbur** comes from the word meaning "to heap" or "pile up." The image is that of a group of people who just happen to be at the same place and time. It's a nominal form of community that is an expression of numbers rather than identity. We might speak of tzibbur when we speak of a crowd who saw a surprise concert by a band or the thousands who were present when President JFK was assassinated. There is no uniting purpose, but in some sense, they are united, having experienced the moment together.

Then there's the word kehillah. This form of community expresses the idea of a collective purpose and that each member contributes to the whole. They don't merely share the same moment. (continued)

They have come together for a communal enterprise that requires individual and collaborative participation and contribution. It is said at Mt. Sinai, Israel becomes a kehillah. Those who were not a people became a people because of God.

It is kehillah that I believe best describes Open House Ministries as a community. We who were not a people have become a people because of God. 35 years ago, the Lord brought together a group of individuals united by a common mission to help homeless families by providing shelter and intervention through Christ-centered, life-changing programs. This vital work could not have continued without the hundreds of volunteers, staff, residents, and donors who generously offer themselves, their time, and their resources.

One of the beautiful and fundamental pillars of Open House Ministries' success is the broad connection and partnership with you. We are not the work of one person, leader, church, or business. We are there result of many people, leaders, churches, and businesses coming together for the past 35 years to see the Kingdom of God established here in Vancouver as it is in heaven. Community, in the deepest, most real sense, is not found. Community is made. It requires effort and work. We observe this truth in Paul's instructions to the Church in Galatia, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way, you will fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2). I see the work of making community with us every time you remember us and our residents in your prayers. It is the work of making a community every time you drop off donations or get your bike serviced at our bike shop. It is the work of making community every time you welcome one of our residents into your businesses and churches. It is the work of making community every time you refer a family in need to us. Every time you share and educate others about our work, you make community with us.

For those reasons and many more, I am so grateful that you walk alongside us, and together we are **kehillah**. Together we have carried the burden of our homeless families in this community. And it's only together that we will continue to do so. • *Chaplain Jon Nichols*
