Today, Cynthia is employed as a receptionist at the Recovery Café of Clark County. She gets excited when she shares how she's learned the names of over 250 members and loves to greet them when they come through the

door. She knows what it feels like to be valued by other people and wants them to know that they matter. She sees how it gives people hope when you recognize them and ask them about their day.

Cynthia loves her job, and she's been given an opportunity to learn new skills through the Recovery Coach Academy. She's so proud of her two kids, Alex and McKynzie. Alex participates in all kinds of sports, and Cynthia beams when she shares how Alex has been growing through a biblically-based boot camp. She lights up when she talks about McKynzie's love for drawing and how she loves to share her artwork. Both kids have great memories of the gatherings

at Open House Ministries, especially at Christmas time when friends reach out to support us and share gifts with our resident families.

We have been blessed to connect with many organizations in our community with the common goal of healing people struggling with homelessness. We are grateful for the support we receive from our faith community and businesses who understand the value of helping vulnerable and hurting people in our community.

Our community is blessed every time a broken family finds acceptance and love. They can then rebuild with confidence and the skills they need to succeed. CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Pressing On Toward The Goal

magine camping all night outside of a store with a friend for a Black Friday sale. Then, as the time arrives for the store to open, a store clerk comes to greet everyone, but he comes with some disappointing news. He informs everyone that the manager is running late and they can't open until he arrives. This letdown is then compounded by the awareness that your phone is on three percent. Because you have been out all night, your phone didn't get a chance to charge on your nightstand, and it's almost dead. So you decide to leave the line and charge your phone in the car. After just a little while, you come back. Yet, to your dismay, when you arrive, you see the store open, the line is gone, people exiting with shopping bags full of merchandise, and the product you waited for is sold out.

If you are anything like me, you feel angry and want to blame someone. You want to blame the manager for being late. You want to blame your friend for not calling you or buying you anything. Blame the store for not handing out line numbers so your spot would have been saved. Blame your phone's battery dying so fast overnight. Blame the mall for making the parking lot so far away. Or even blame the entire US economy and culture for making Black Friday sales a thing.

This frustration is how I used to read the parable of the Bridesmaids in Matthew 25:1-13. In this parable, ten bridesmaids are on their way to a wedding when they hear the bridegroom is delayed and they must wait. Five of them forgot to bring oil for their lamps, and so they leave in the middle of the night to find more. Meanwhile, in the time they are gone, the bridegroom arrives, and the wedding commences. When the five bridesmaids who left return, they are shut out of the wedding.

What I struggled to understand at first is that this is not a parable about poor planning. Yes, we could all learn from the Scout motto, "Be Prepared." Sometimes, the unexpected happens. Sometimes, poor planning creates emergencies. Yet, this is not the lesson of this parable.

The bridesmaids were there to attend a wedding. Likewise, the purpose of camping outside of a store on Black Friday is to attend a sale. It's not about not having a charged phone. There is no one to blame but myself if I forget that's why I'm there. This highlights the difference between the groups of bridesmaids. Five thought the goal was to have full lamps. Five knew the goal was to attend a wedding. The wise in this story are not identified because they planned ahead. The wise in this story are identified because they knew the goal and didn't waver from it.

As we come to the end of the year and look ahead to a new year, it is imperative we have a clear understanding of our purpose and goal we are striving toward. Remembering what the Apostle Paul writes in Philippians 4:13-14, "Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus."
