onversations the past few weeks have reminded me of the seemly subtle but important difference between the two statements:

It doesn't matter what we do, God loves us.

Regardless of what we do, God loves us.

What is true in both statements is there is nothing we did to earn God's love and nothing we could do that would cause God to stop loving us. God's love comes with no preconditions. Paul declares this beautiful truth in Romans 5:8 which states, "God demonstrated his own love for us in this, while we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

The subtle but important difference between the two is that God does care about what we do. God cares about what we do not because he wants something *from* us, but because he wants something *for* us. God wants for his creation to flourish. He wants us all to experience the good and beautiful life with him. As Paul wrote, "God's goal is for us to become mature adults—to be fully grown, measured by the standard of the fullness of Christ." (Ephesians 4:13)

What we do and how we live matters. Sin has consequences. All who have sinned or been sinned against know the devastating power of sin. Yet, God's love is never held out as a reward or punishment for human behavior. Thank God for this! I know my heart needs to hear this. One of the ruinous lies that the enemy whispers to us when we sin is that we now need to hide from God. In our sin, we wonder if God can and still loves us. Worse yet we begin to think we need to fix ourselves to be worthy of his love. These lies not only keep us from experiencing God's love, but they also ultimately keep us from experiencing the joy of life with Christ. For the joy of life with Christ is a life like Christ.

This is what's so amazing about grace. God meets us where we are, and God does not leave us there. God comes to us in our sin and brokenness and leads us to new life. He washes us clean and helps us to our feet so that we may walk with him. We could never *out sin* God's grace, nor should we want to once we've truly tasted how good it is. Regardless of what we do, God loves us.

Children and Charity

Many questions arise when we consider the options for giving to our children. Why should we give? When, what and how should we give? Will gifts impact the self-esteem and initiative of the child? Can a gift plan transfer values to children?

These are all important questions. Clearly there are better ways to give and a prudent parent will consider carefully the manner, nature and amount of gifts to be of the best benefit and value for the child. There are many considerations and we have an excellent paper on the "Seven Questions on Gifts to Children" that we would be delighted to send you.

In the same way gifts to charity, especially larger gifts and perhaps gifts from assets, might create questions about how, when and what might be the best type of gift to make. The necessity to feel comfortable about having enough to last for your lifetime is important as well as possible tax consequences. For most people a beguest from your estate would be a logical gift and even a small percentage could be significant for the charity and much larger than what you're capable of giving during your lifetime. A possible consideration would be to treat charity as one of your children, which is what I have decided to do.
