artistic gift. Art of Faith uses creative
processes to help residents discover
the beauty of what God is doing in
each one of their lives.

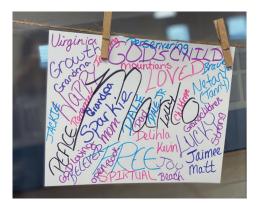
"At first, I was apprehensive because I haven't ever thought of myself as an artistic person. ... Nonetheless, I kept an open mind and quickly realized that *Art of Faith* isn't about who's a better artist or more creative," one resident added, "it's about expressing ourselves and our faith through art."

People often enter Open House Ministries with a resistance to change, frustrated and hurt from past experiences, and weighed down by guilt or anxiety. Rather than engaging in conversation concerning change, *Art of Faith* immerses residents in an environment where they can begin to process tough emotions.





Meaningful themes focus on purpose, grief and forgiveness, change and adversity, identity, belonging, and strength. Many residents struggle with expressing what they are going through and avoid facing deep emotional trauma. (Continued)

- God helps those who help themselves

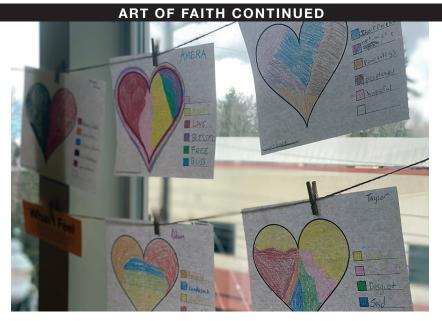

Or when our items at the mini-mart add up to more than the cash we have, we rifle through the *take-a-penny*, *leave-a-penny* dish and smile at the cashier hoping for a little grace.

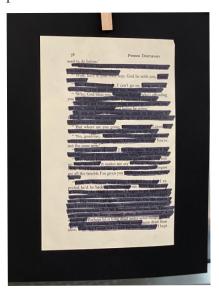

The projects in the ten-week art therapy class are intentionally designed to create a courageous space for honest and deep reflection. "No matter the age of a person or their skill set," states Patti Ellias, instructor for *Art of Faith*, "art is a portal through which life experiences can be expressed or processed with authenticity and vulnerability."

This process is empowering our residents to sit with heavy emotions and learn new ways to approach painful memories and situations.



"It truly helped me express my feelings in a fresh way," states one resident. "It helped me to see and look more for God in everything."

Residents are encouraged to explore an assortment of creative techniques using applied arts, music, and several forms of poetry in an informal atmosphere. Collages are made from recycled found objects, paper mâché masks are created, and residents craft personal statements using lyrics from songs and redactive print exercises. "The goal is never about the finished product," said Patti. "The purpose is always found in the process and through art learn to embrace life experiences as an opportunity to build character and strength and to identify brokenness with God's redeeming love."

Residents are sharing how much they've enjoyed expressing themselves through art, saving pieces meaningful to them, and displaying them in their homes. It is a blessing to see God moving in their hearts and how *Art of Faith* has been significant to them. •
