Peace, Patience and a Place to Live

THANK YOU FROM SANDY



You may recall that last November the feature resident story was about Sandy, a mother of twin 7 year olds who had recently come to the shelter. Every new family entering Open House is told "You can stay one week at a time, for

as long as it takes." Here is your update about how Sandy's life is unfolding, one week at a time.

A bit of background for you...Sandy's story began in Albany, OR. Her addictions started with prescription pain killers prescribed during the twins' pregnancy. When the twins were 1 year old, her mother — her best friend — died unexpectedly. Clouded in a "deep, dark depression", Sandy turned to pills, alcohol and weed, then eventually, meth. Combined with a toxic relationship (the twins' father), her life was "chipping away" with drug use, fighting and domestic violence laced with multiple traumatizing incidents for her and her children. CPS was involved, her teenage son left, no longer wanting to be around the drugs and the abuse and everything was falling apart. But it wasn't until after an 8 hour standoff of her partner holding her hostage at knife point that Sandy took action. She talked him into letting her go, and immediately sought police intervention and restraint on him. And it was then that Sandy owned up to her part; she was an addict. Treatment followed.

For the first time in 8 years, Sandy was clean and sober. She was able to get her 7

year old twins back. But her path wasn't flawless, and in June, 2016, they were homeless, sleeping every night in the back of relatives' vehicles. It was then that a friend of a friend told her about Open House. For weeks she called back, hoping and praying for a chance. And the chance came.

"I have learned that God has bigger plans than I ever realized. I cannot tell you how much this place has changed my life. God shook me up and took everything away. But slowly, patiently, God is putting everything back into my life." She adds, "When I first saw my apartment, I literally fell to my knees crying. I had lost everything and you gave me this beautiful place to live."

In April, Sandy lost her father. "This com-

munity kept me from going back to drugs. I have been taught the meaning of peace here."

Sandy has loved working in the Clothing Annex and the sorting room. Yet she admits she gets anxious about next steps. "I think God wanted me to be here at this time to learn patience. Before, I was always 'My way, and quick, quick, quick." She holds onto Lori [Richardson's] advice; "Pray, be patient and it will come to you when God wants it to." And after months of wait list, mere days before this writing, Sandy's prayers were answered: she has now received notice that she has been



accepted into a housing program that will allow her and the twins to get their own apartment beyond the shelter.

Sandy's voice goes quiet as she reflects on the losses of the last three years. The hardest has been the separation from her (now) 17 year old son. "He didn't want to have anything to do with me while [the twin's dad] was around." For months Sandy has prayed that she would one day see him again. Her voice chokes, "Out of the blue, just before the end of October, he contacted me and drove up to visit us here. The first visit in three years. I cannot tell you how much that means to me! My prayers were answered. I am in awe right now."

"I have always been a spiritual person. When I came here, the first thing I learned is trust in the



Lord, pray and let Him do the work. They say, 'Believe and you shall receive'. I am living proof of that."
