## Year End Giving

As a supporter of Open House Ministries, your gifts throughout the year have enabled us to help change our residents' lives in so many ways. Many of you have decided to make gifts directly from your IRA to maximize your gifts and avoid unnecessary taxes. Another way we have received numerous gifts is from your Donor Advised Fund (sometimes known as a Giving Fund or similar names). These funds can be set up in numerous ways, but one of the best ways is transferring appreciated stock to avoid capital gains taxes. This makes larger year-end gifts possible and gives you the flexibility to delay making a large gift while providing you with a current year tax deduction. This can allow you to take time to prayerfully consider where, when and how much to give and plan a more comprehensive giving strategy.

Giving appreciated assets can make you a more cheerful giver because these assets are almost like a gift from God. Thanks to His leading, you have enjoyed a blessing that acknowledges the fact that He is the rightful owner of all that we have, and we are just trying to be a good steward of what He has entrusted to us.

## Rooted in Christ or arranged in a vase?

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his time of year the sidewalks are covered in leaves. The air is crisp, the colors are rich, and it feels like the whole world is letting go. It's not so different from the vase of fresh flowers on the counter, dropping its petals—both are beautiful, both will soon fade, yet the reason why changes everything.

A leaf falls because it belongs to a tree. Its season has run its course, but the roots are still alive, holding fast through winter, ready to send out new life in the spring. That's change, not death.

Cut flowers are another story. Their roots are gone. They may look alive for a while—bright, fragrant, arranged just so—but what looks like life is really the slow fade of death.

That difference is everything. From the outside, leaves and cut flowers look the same. And when families arrive at Open House Ministries, their struggles

often look the same too—loss, instability, hardship. But what's happening underneath matters. Some are in a hard season with roots still drawing strength. Others show what is true of us all apart from Christ: like cut flowers, we can look put-together for a time, but without roots we cannot endure.

Genesis tells the story plainly. God warned Adam, "In the day you eat of it you shall surely die" (Genesis 2:17). A warning that can sound confusing, because there they stood in the sunlight after eating the fruit. Still breathing. Still alive to the eye. Yet the devastating sever had taken place. The first sign wasn't their bodies falling to the ground, but their hearts pulling away. They ran and hid. The closeness they once knew with God was replaced with fear, shame, and distance. What had

been a secure attachment was now a broken one.

Parenting classes, job training, and financial help, are all good and necessary things. But if that's all we give, it's like topping off the vase or trimming the stems. You don't tape dead flowers back onto a tree. And you don't fix rootless life by adding a little sugar to the water. What people need is to be rooted again—to belong, to be securely attached, to draw life from Christ himself. And this attachment isn't something we can manufacture; it comes only as a gift of grace.

One resident put it this way: "My faith was dead before I came here. But in the very first class I started to

feel it come alive again." The truth was they didn't need to tell me that for it to be unmistakable. I could already see it—not because faith itself can be seen, but

because its fruit can. I saw resilience where there had only been despair. I saw courage to face the courts, to tell the truth, to walk into counseling, to begin rebuilding trust with children. Those are not small things.

At the end of the day, that's the test. Are we rooted in Christ, or are we only arranged in the vase? One lasts. The other is just display until the petals fall. And it isn't only individuals who face that question—whole cultures do too. A vase full of cut flowers can look alive for a season, but without roots, the fading is certain. That's why the work of Open House Ministries is not just about keeping appearances fresh, but about helping people put down roots in the only place life endures.
