# From life behind bars to community and Christ

For most people, it's nearly impossible to fully comprehend being arrested, booked into jail and sentenced to serve, whether long or short. Tina, a resident at Open House Ministries, can comprehend life behind bars all-too well.

Tina grew up in Battle Ground and was plagued with bipolar disorder and alcoholism throughout her life. At age 48, she was incarcerated at the Washington Corrections Center for

Women in Gig Harbor, Washington, for 15 months.

The 50-year-old shares, "Prison life was hard and lonely. I had a cellmate who was serving three consecutive life sentences. I saw lots of women who were in for decades, and I didn't want that to be me. I missed my sons and my mother terribly."

During her time in prison, Tina was determined to make big changes. She read the Bible and spent nearly everyday in the chapel attending services.

"I tried to learn as much about our Lord as possible.

This was where I finally realized I was forgiven my sins and where I began my relationship with Jesus," says Tina.

She adds, "I prayed and prayed for God to show me the way and help me change my life. I wanted to create a better version of myself." She did. "I gave glory to God, and He carried me through prison," Tina said.

Tina was released, but, unfortunately, she again made choices that put her behind bars. Toward the end of a 65-day stint at Clark Coun-

ty Jail in downtown Vancouver, she participated in the Clark County Jail's re-entry program. The program offers inmates access to community resources including education, housing options, addiction rehabilitation and more. This is where Tina was first introduced to Open House Ministries and its faith-based environment and teachings.

"Open House was a safe place for me to live

where I could address other things like my overall health, mental health and work experience," Tina says. "When you don't have a stable place to live, you can't do anything else very well." She moved into the shelter in October 2018 and lives there today.

Tough work has ensued over the past 10 months — outpatient, co-occurring-disorder classes, therapy sessions, Bible studies, chapel, job training and financial management courses. During this time, Tina has been faithful with her medications and

has been clean and sober for more than a year.

"Every day, I feel the Lord. I knew He had a path for me, and I prayed He would show it to me, and He did," says Tina.

Today, Tina is expanding her job skills by working at Open House's thrift store, Secondhand Solutions. She coordinates outfits and accessories, dressing mannequins and assisting customers. She also continues to grow her relationships with her biggest blessings — her two grown sons.

"I was broken," recounts Tina. "I am so thank (Continued on page 3)

## Chaplain's Corner

For months, my brother, Mike, and I have been preparing for a big adventure — Route 66: Breaking the Cycle of Homelessness. In early September, we, along with our wives, Gini and Sherrill, will leave in an RV for Chicago, where we will start a 2,448-mile bicycle ride to Santa Monica, California, along historic Route 66.

The purpose of the ride is to raise money for and awareness about the homeless families at Open House Ministries. We are asking for you to join us in that! Every penny of the proceeds will go to Open House


Ministries. If we can raise between \$13 and \$14 a mile, per rider, we can make our goal of raising \$66,000 on Route 66.

We are diligently addressing the myriad of details, not the least of which is a requisite 50 miles per day of "saddle time," readying the body for 70 to 110 miles per day for 30-plus bicycling days. We are gearing up, getting up and giving up our vacation time for this endeavor.

One fun fact of long-distance bicycling is that we will need to eat 6,000 calories a day to keep our strength. For that reason, the RV with its food supply and our wives, will always be ahead of us, just beyond our reach. That will keep us pedalling!

Today, I ask you to undergird this endeavor with prayer. Listen to the Apostle Paul:

"So I wouldn't get a big head, I was given the gift of a handicap to keep me in constant touch with my limitations. At first I did not regard it as a gift, and begged God to remove it. He told me, 'My grace is enough; it's all you need. My strength comes into its own in your weakness.' Now, I quit



focusing on the handicap and appreciate the gift. It was a case of Christ's strength moving in on my weakness. Now I take my limitations in stride, they cut me down in size, and so the weaker I get, the stronger I become." (2 Corinthians 12:7-10, The Message)

I was recently asked about my greatest hopes and concerns for the trip. Hopefully, God will allow the time with Gini, Mike and Sherrill to blossom. But moreso, I seek protracted time alone with God on my bicycle: time to pray, praise, revel in His creation and in the crown jewel of His creation — us!

My only concern is that Jesus would be so very obvious to the Open House Ministries family, and to continue to break the cycle of the bondage of sin and homelessness which dominates so many.


## Oh, Baby!

## Back-to-school tradition, made possible by donors




